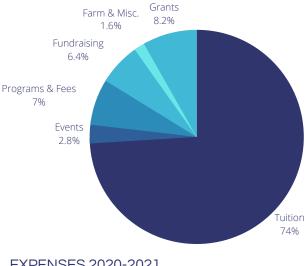

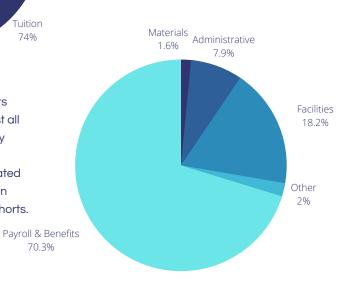
EXPENSES 2020-2021

To adjust to our lowered enrollment, we cut costs significantly in our 20-21 budget, pausing almost all specialty classes. As we came out of emergency childcare, we added back in handwork, art, and movement. We had some additional COVID-related costs in cleaning and technology supplies, and in assistant teachers needed to facilitate small cohorts. TOTAL EXPENSE: \$1,350,533

REVENUE 2020-2021

We enrolled over a dozen new students between Sept and May last year, which helped our revenue predictions significantly. We had excellent support from our families during annual giving and other fundraising campaigns. We also received some grants related to our designation as an emergency childcare provider.

TOTAL REVENUE: \$1,382,518



What steps are we taking to strengthen the financial outlook for the school?





A budget built on the income we have.

This means we shape our expenses to fit the income we know we can count on, rather than vice versa. We sometimes have to make tough choices, but in the long run it sets us up for greater growth and stability.

2 An accurate picture of long term maintenance needs.

We have assessed the maintenance needs for the two properties and will now budget for yearly contributions to a reserve fund to cover large expenses.

3 Strategic priorities guide budget decisions.

If an opportunity arises that does not fit within the strategic priorities we have identified as a school, we set it aside so we stay focused in our growth.

4 Wide variety of funding sources.

We have greatly expanded our funding sources in the past year – including different grants, a very low-interest small business loan, title funds, and several new private donors.

5 Close, ongoing tracking.

Even best laid plans sometimes go awry. We have frequent conversations to make sure we're on target for our budget predictions. And if we're not - we make adjustments as needed.
